Lincoln Facility Gets an Upgrade

Abraham Lincoln High School is set for a major transformation featuring upgraded facilities and a state-of-the-art turf field starting as soon as 2025.

On November 5th, San Francisco voters approved a \$790 million bond, opening up opportunity for various changes to the school, including a potential switch from grass to a turf field, repairing wheelchair access elevators, and installing an outdoor generator.

A bond is a loan issued by governments or corporations to a company or organization, like SFUSD, that will eventually be paid back with interest. The difference is that a loan is borrowing from a bank and a bond is borrowing from a government or corporation.

SFUSD created their bond program in 2003 and which has allowed SFUSD to invest more than \$2 billion in school building improvements. In the process of giving SFUSD the bond money, the city of San Francisco hopes to give schools a much needed opportunity for improvements as well as collect money from interest.

Lincoln will be given millions of dollars of the bond money for specific projects on campus in the coming years.

Kate Levitt, the Director of Communication at SFUSD's bond program, voices, "The SFUSD Bond Program is excited to make these essential improvements at Lincoln High School. We use data on facilities conditions to help us prioritize projects, and recognize the need to complete roofing repairs and replacement at several locations at the school."

A new outdoor stand-by natural gas-operated generator is scheduled to be constructed. Installation will began in December 2024 and be completed by summer 2025. Around the city, four sites, Lincoln being the fourth, have generators, each covering a quadrant of the

city; these generators will ensure Internet connection in the face of an emergency for all SFUSD sites. Lincoln will cover the southwest quadrant of the city.

Levitt explains, "The generator is a districtwide priority to support connectivity in the event of an emergency."

SFUSD analyzes every building in the department to see which need maintenance and upgrades. They found out some roofs at Lincoln experienced decay and weathering and need replacement. The roofs over the entrance at Quintara and 24th Ave, Quintara and 22nd Ave, and the North Gym have a tentative construction schedule of June to September 2025.

Levitt explains other projects the bond will fund, "We are working in partnership with the SFUSD Athletics office to make field and facilities upgrades around the district, including the upcoming Lincoln project."

Shari Balisi, the principal of Lincoln, tells us more about these upgrades, including getting a sound system down there as opposed to always renting it."

This new public address system will have a much larger coverage and includes associated cabling, integrated clock-bell devices, exterior speakers, wall speakers and head-end equipment. This system is theoretically ready, however delays from external vendors and delivery companies leave its completion until winter break. It will be ready for the second semester.

Balisi believes the most significant change this money will bring is converting our school's grass field to turf. Abraham Lincoln is one of the few public schools left in San Francisco with a real grass playing field, but gopher holes have littered the field, and many players have

gotten hurt because of them. A grass field also requires a higher upkeep cost than a turf field.

Around the field the track is planned to be replaced. The top layer that athletes run on will be pulled up like a bandage and then a new layer of synthetic rubber laid down.

Balisi says, "Work is in progress right now. We are working with the architects; we are working with engineers and the contractors, but you probably won't see the work until, I'm hoping, [no later than] 2026."

These plans are currently in what's called the project assessment phase. Engineers and architects are brought in to analyze for things like water damage, and, if the budget allows, the bleachers, locker rooms and storm water management will potentially be upgraded.

The wheelchair access elevators at the 22nd Ave. entrance to the field will definitely be upgraded. For years these elevators have been in dysfunction, leading those with disabilities with no way to reach higher bleachers. Because this is such an obvious limitation, this work will likely be prioritized over the bleachers and locker rooms.

All of the projects mentioned by Balisi have funding from this bond and another from 2016.

Levitt informs us that some projects do not have room for input and feedback, but others do. The athletic field, for example, may use the input of teachers, family, and the community.

Levitt illustrates, "We want to make improvements to as many school sites as we can."





2025 Wall of Fame inductees

REV. FREDERICK HAYNES, III

Rev. Frederick Haynes, III grew up in San Francisco, where his father, pastored at the historic Third Baptist Church, the first African-American Baptist congregation west of the Rocky Mountains.

When his father died in 1975, young Frederick Haynes, only 14, entered Lincoln High School. Despite the tragic loss of his father, that son would excel at Lincoln. He was the valedictorian at graduation.

After Lincoln, Rev. Haynes earned a Bachelor of Arts in Religion and English at Bishop College, a Master of Divinity degree from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary and a Doctor of Ministry degree from the Graduate Theological Foundation. He also has received a Ph.D. from the Christian Theological Seminary, where he studied African American preaching and sacred rhetoric. He became Senior Pastor of Dallas's Friendship-West Baptist

Church in 1983 which grew to over 13,000 members. At Friendship-West, Rev. Haynes worked to address issues like social injustice, domestic violence, environmental racism and voting rights and, importantly, predatory lending practices.

In 2022, President Biden awarded him the Joseph R. Biden Jr. Presidential Lifetime Achievement Leadership Award in Community Service.

HELEN DILWORTH

Helen Dilworth, known to her voice students as Dr. Diva, possesses an exceptional soprano voice, praised by none other than Leontyne Price. Following Lincoln, Helen earned a Bachelor's and Master's degree from San Francisco State, a Master's degree from Stanford and a doctorate from USC. Accepted to the prestigious Merola program at SF Opera, Helen has excelled at both performance and education. She taught at the high school level and college (SF State, SF City

College and the Conservatory of Music). She has performed many soloist roles and the Baton Rouge Opera (Magic Flute) to oratorios with major symphony orchestra such as Beethoven's Missa Solemnis (SF Symphony) and Mozart's Mass in C Major (Robert Shaw). She is adept in gospel music as well as She has recorded on the Cambria label

from opera with the San Francisco Opera Broadway (Kurt Weill's Lost in the Stars). (Songs of Love and Chamber Works).


