



SAN FRANCISCO — There might not be a more scenic high school vantage point in America.

Washington High School Stadium, overlooking San Francisco's iconic Golden Gate Bridge, is breathtaking from about every angle (see photo page 15).

On Friday, in the 77th Big Bell Game, the host Eagles were hoping to end a nine-year drought against arch-rival Lincoln. With a surprising 7-1 overall record and 4-0 in Academic Athletic Association play, Washington's hopes didn't appear fleeting.

But after a 49-0 Mustangs' hammering, Lincoln coach had his breath taken away. Even he wasn't expecting such a dominating, lopsided win.

The Mustangs improved to 6-3 and all but clinched another AAA regular-season title at 5-0.

According to reports from The San Francisco Standard, Lincoln's defense forced six turnovers and turned them into 30 points, including pick 6s from Jamelle Newman and Jaylen Lopez, who also returned a fumble for a score.
