Thanks for reading! We look forward to seeing you at upcoming alumni reunions and other ALHS Mustang Alumni events.



From ALHS Graduate to SF Supervisor: Mustangs of All Ages Celebrate Alan Wong, Class of 2005

On a cool, sunny day in December 2025, Alan Wong (Class of 2005), was sworn in as Interim San Francisco Supervisor for the Sunset District by Mayor Daniel Lurie. The swearing-in ceremony took place on the front stairs of Lincoln's main entrance on 24th Avenue, with dozens of alumni, current students, local residents, City Hall officials, ALHS teachers and administrators in attendance.

Meet Alan Wong, Class of 2005, Newest Member of the SF Board of Supervisors

During his senior year at Lincoln, Alan Wong (Class of 2005) noticed something that worried him. In the cafeteria, refuse containers positioned near the exits and alongside support pillars in the cavernous space were one-size-fits-all: No recycling bins were available for the disposable food trays, aluminum cans, plastics, and other items that by the mid-2000s were regularly separated by municipalities that had implemented eco-friendly policies, including in San Francisco.

So, he developed a plan: He tapped his network of friends at Lincoln, and over a few days, they set up and labeled bins for recycling in the cafeteria and undertook an informal campaign to encourage students to begin separating their waste materials.

“I just took it upon myself. I thought, ‘Hey: Why aren’t we recycling all of our cafeteria trays?’” Supervisor Wong recalled. “So, on my own, I just started getting people to separate their garbage from their trays during lunch. I got some volunteers to help me here and there, and we just did it,” he said.

That instinct for public service and for organizing and motivating peers into positive action has undoubtedly stayed with him since he graduated from Lincoln. And in December 2025, on the front stairs of Abraham Lincoln High School, Alan Wong was sworn in by San Francisco Mayor Daniel Lurie as an Interim member of the Board of Supervisors, representing District 4, which is home to ALHS.



His appointment to the SF Board of Supervisors is in keeping with a long, proud legacy of earlier ALHS alumni who dedicated their lives to public service after graduating, including the late Phil Burton (Class of '50), who served on the SF Board of Supervisors, as a U.S. Congressman, and in other state elected roles over a long career.

During an interview with the Alumni Association Log at Lincoln in January 2026, Supervisor Wong reflected on his years as a student at Lincoln High in the early to mid-2000s, sharing insights on his time as a Mustang. Throughout, it was evident that his life experience, including growing up in a working-class family in the Sunset District, shaped his decision to enter public service work, including as a Student Delegate to the SF Board of Supervisors while he was attending Lincoln, then as a Red Cross worker, and an enlisted member of the Army National Guard (where he continues to serve).

Most recently, he has worked at a city agency focused on family services; as a member of the board at SF City College, and now, in a full-circle moment, as interim member of the SF Board of Supervisors.

Among all the steps in his journey so far, being sworn-in to serve as a member of the SF Board of Supervisors during a ceremony at Lincoln High in late 2025, was unmistakably awe-inspiring, said Supervisor Wong. “It was awesome to be able to be back at my alma mater...at the place where it all started for me as a youngster,” he said. “It was coming back home.”

He recalled that when he was elected to be a Student Delegate to the SF Board of Supervisors during his years attending Lincoln, the San Francisco Chronicle wrote a story on his experience – and featured a photo of young Alan Wong standing on the very same front stairs where he was sworn in as Interim member of the board more than twenty years later.

Supervisor Wong recalled that his time as Student Delegate to the SF Board of Supervisors decades ago, “was an adventure. I had always wanted to get more involved in service, and student government, even when I was at Hoover [Middle School]; I wanted to get more involved, but I didn’t really have the confidence then,” he said. When he entered Lincoln as a freshman, along with his required classes, he signed up for the track team, soccer, and Dragon Boat.

Supervisor Wong now jokes, “I wasn’t particularly good at anything. But during my first year at Lincoln, when I was into soccer and track, I gained a bit of confidence, and that really got me wanting to pursue what I had been interested in before. So, I ran for ASB’s director of publicity role...and I drafted my speech at home and practiced it. I remember giving it my all. I talked about my passion and why I wanted to get involved.” Later, he transitioned into student government, where he fit comfortably into duties focused on events planning for the student body.

Supervisor Wong credited current ALHS Alumni Association President Jon Woo ('05), and Shawn Yee ('03) with encouraging him to consider participating in the SF City Student Advisory Council, which is the SF Unified Public Schools' liaison unit for high schools. "Later on, there was a vacancy for the Student Delegate's position [at the SF Board of Supervisors]. He developed posters and talking points and campaigned at other high schools across the district.

He won a district-wide election and joined the SF Board of Supervisors as one of two Student Delegates. "My big turning point was being able to participate in track and soccer....it gave me a lot of confidence, and helped me build camaraderie with my classmates." That experience, in turn, led Supervisor Wong to continue active roles in student representation at Lincoln – a trajectory that directly ties to his recent appointment to the SF Board of Supervisors.

Looking back, Supervisor Wong says his instinctive drive to work in areas that benefit the greater good – known as public service occupations – was indeed forged at Lincoln. He tacitly encourages members of the public, including current and former ALHS students, to seriously consider the value of public service work.

"People can serve in many different ways. Some people can become school teachers; others can become firefighters, or journalists. My path has always been wanting to be a Servant Leader, and that's why, after graduating from high school here, I served in the American Red Cross. And I have, and continue to serve in the Army National Guard, for sixteen-plus years...also as a union organizer; also, I've worked at City Hall on policies. Directly before getting appointed [to the SF Board of Supervisors], I served as policy director at Children's Council of San Francisco, helping families get access to childcare here in our city. So, for me, it's always been about public service," said Supervisor Wong. "What ultimately drives me is a sense of responsibility, and duty to serve."

He credits his mother and father, both immigrants from Hong Kong, with imbuing in him a strong work-ethic and a desire to focus on public service work. “My dad and my mom, they worked really hard to allow me to survive in the city. My dad went to the culinary program at City College of San Francisco, then he was able to become a union hotel cook, and support our family for decades. My mom was a home-maker, and we lived in In-Law housing here in the Sunset District for decades. So, for me, being able to serve in a broad capacity of helping others is something that was gifted to me by my parents,” said Supervisor Wong.

Hopefully, Supervisor Wong’s long-ago experience of impulsively organizing the recycling effort at ALHS’s cafeteria – an

instinct for positive action that helped shape the road to his current role – stands as a source of inspiration for public school students district-wide, including at ALHS.

Now, more than 20 years after that impromptu effort in ALHS’s cafeteria, he offers clear, actionable advice to current and future student bodies of SF Unified Schools: “I think if students want to participate and be more involved, half the battle is showing up. Just being there, consistently being there. Sometimes you may miss an opportunity, and sometimes you’ll get one,” said Supervisor Wong. “But if you keep showing up, then things will come through. So if people want to get involved in public service, or politics, half the battle is showing up.”

Lincoln Girls Volleyball Wins its First Back to Back Championship in 15 Years

On Wednesday, November 5th, at Kezar Pavilion for the city championship, Lincoln was down two sets to Lowell. Lincoln battled back to win a 25-19 set, keeping them alive. They went on to win another nail biting set 25-23, taking them to the fifth set, a tie-breaker decided by the first to reach 15 points. The score was tied at game point, both teams fighting back and forth, needing to win by two points. Senior Katherine Chan scored the final point, ending the intense three-hour battle with a final score of 19-17 and a Mustang win. The team collapsed into each other on the court, overtaken with pure joy and emotion.

Junior and captain Kylah Kaywood expressed, "It felt like all the long practices, the hard moments, and the times we pushed each other finally paid off."

The Mustangs had an undefeated league season and a 36-9 overall record, adding the 2025 AAA city championship to their long list of wins. This year's season marked the first back-to-back city championships victory since 2010, breaking Lowell's streak of four back-to-back wins.

Lincoln dominated both regular season games against Lowell, so being down two sets was unusual for this normally unbeatable team.

Head Coach Vincent Tang, with six city titles for Lincoln girls volleyball states, "Going into the game, I knew we had the better team. Our girls proved it throughout the season, beating them twice in league and once at a tournament. I think we had more weapons offensively, and our blocking and defense were better as well."

Kaywood noted, “They came out with a lot of energy, and everything they were doing seemed to be working. It [just] took us a little bit to settle in and adjust, but once we did, the game started to feel more like our pace.”

The city championship led them to place second in Division Three and to host San Marin—15th place—on November 11th, in the first of a five-round win- win-or-go-home state championship bracket.

They swept San Marin in an easy three sets, sending them to the second round against Riordan High School on November 13th.

Riordan started strong, winning the first set 25-18, but Lincoln fought back to dominate the next two sets. Riordan didn't go without a fight, winning the fourth set 25-20, sending them to yet another fifth set tiebreaker, which Lincoln ended up winning 15-11. After his team scored the game point, Coach Tang ran to his team, shouting out in pure joy and pride.



If they were to win that game and go to the state championship, they would've been the second team in Lincoln Volleyball history to go to a state championship game. The first was in 2017, when they became the first San Francisco public school to reach a state championship game in any sport.

Nonetheless, this team has gone the furthest into states since 2017 due to hard work and teamwork.

Kaywood stated, “We didn't let tough games break our momentum.”

Coach Tang stated, “I was so proud of them.”

Winning the second round of states advanced Lincoln to the regional semifinals against Foothill High School on November 15th. Foothill's crowd supported them throughout the game with loud cheers and colorful signs, but it wasn't enough to defeat Lincoln. They won three sets to one, securing a spot at the regional finals in Redwood City at Sequoia High School.

Lincoln girls volleyball's successful season ended there with a 3-2 set loss in the Regional Finals, one game away from the State Championship. This matchup was one of the closest they've ever had, with each loss within five points or less.







Scuba Storyteller: Mostly Humorous Diving Tales by an Addicted AquaNut



IN MEMORIAM



Justice Donald B. King

F1948 02/24/1931 - 11/15/2025

Justice Donald B. King (ret.) passed away at the age of 94 on November 15, 2025. He died

peacefully and with grace and courage, his wife Nikki and his son Jordan by his side.

Don was born in San Francisco in 1931 and lived there until 2009, when he and Nikki moved to Santa Rosa. He graduated from Lincoln High School and attended University of San Francisco for both college and law school. During the summer after his second year of law school, he played basketball on a U.S. State Department goodwill tour of Central and South America, competing against several Olympic national teams. His teammates included future NBA greats Bill Russell and K.C. Jones.

After graduating from law school, Don spent nearly two decades in private civil practice in the West Portal neighborhood of San Francisco. He was also in politics, serving as Chair of the San Francisco Democratic Central Committee from 1962 to 1966. Jordan was born in 1970.

Justice Don served as a Judge of the San Francisco Superior Court from 1976 to 1982 and as a Justice of the California Court of Appeal from 1983 to 1996. He was a giant in the field of California family law. On the trial bench, Don pioneered the use of mediation in marital dissolution and child custody proceedings, which brought a paradigm shift from an adversarial model to one of helping the parties to collectively make their own best decisions.

On the appellate bench, Don published hundreds of precedential opinions, making key contributions to the development of California law on a wide variety of subjects. He also co-authored the leading treatise on California family law, The Rutter Group's California Practice Guide: Family Law. After leaving the bench, he continued his work in family law as a practicing arbitrator and mediator, staying active into his early 90s.

Don was thoughtful, wise, patient, calm and composed, both on the bench and in his personal affairs. He had the perfect judicial temperament. He lived a good life from start to finish and died with a smile on his face.

A celebration of life will be announced at a future date.
